Action plan

Now that the Steering Group has been formed, we need to make the neighbourhood planning process meaningful for everyone who has a stake in the outcome. This means, first of all, making them aware that they have an important opportunity to express their concerns and wishes for the future; and listening to the comments and ideas they put forward.

We'll be spreading the word and organising or appearing at a number of events in the village. The focus groups (see box below) will reach out to all the different parts of the community: young and old, residents and businesses, those who feel threatened by new housing developments and those who see an opportunity to sustain a thriving village. Volunteers will be needed for all sorts of roles: publicising events, mounting displays, manning stalls, listening to people and having conversations with them, making tea, sharing what other people are saying ...

When key issues have been identified, we'll build an evidence base using questionnaires and surveys.

The groups include: Liaison with MSDC, Publicity, Community engagement, Business, Utilities, Health and welfare.

Proposed housing developments

Artisan-PPS recently distributed a leaflet to all households in Woolpit showing their latest proposed plan. It is broadly similar to the second-stage plan published on their website in February, but there are several differences.

They followed this up with a new consultation and exhibition in St Mary's Church on Monday 4 April, where more details were available, especially with respect to the floor plans and building materials to be used.
